
GENERAL BULLETIN



VISIT TO SOUTH KOREA PROVINCE

The MSC Philippine Region of Korea became a Province in its own right earlier this year. This meant they needed to hold their first ever Provincial Chapter to discern how to fulfil their mission as a province and carry out the Chapter mandate by electing their own Provincial Superior and Council. I was privileged to be there for that Chapter and to meet our men and see their places of ministry.

I was met in Seoul Airport by Matthew Park, MSC (Provincial) and Michael In-Jun Cho, MSC (Assistant Secretary). Their fraternal

welcome was indicative of the hospitality I experienced throughout the province.

At the Provincial House I met, Matthew, Ludovico, Michael, John Juanito. and Benedict Lee, as well as Regina the cook and husband handyman Joseph. With Matthew and Ludovico, I went to old novitiate the

buildings at Paju. The Korean novitiate is now combined with that of the Philippines and Vietnam north of Manila. During the evening we walked around Seoul city. A memorial of great sadness is there for the hundreds, mainly school children, lost in the Sewol Ferry disaster four years ago. Next day we met with the Gyeongin MSC Scholasticate and Retreat House, with beautiful Sanctuary of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, in Ganghwa. In the evening the Provincial Chapter preparatory committee met. I took the KTX Bullet Train travelling at 300km/ hr, from Seoul to PyeongChang in the mountainous east where we met with the GangWon MSC at BongPyeong Retreat House. The chapel is stunning in simplicity. Korea culture emphasises harmony and balance. Life



here is best represented by circles rather than squares, movement rather than stasis. Here we received a warm welcome from John Chai, John Hwang and Augustine. Over the weekend we visited GyeongSang community in Ulsan, Yangsan and Pusan, as well as the MSC Sister's in Pusan. We met Gaspar Lee, Thomas Khan and Dominic and saw the two MSC houses for homeless boys in Ulsan and one in Yongsan. We spent time sharing with the boys and staff. In Pusan we met Joseph Kim who is chaplain to the MSC Sisters. Sr Gregoriana MSC the

> Korean Provincial showed us through their spiritually Centre in Central Pusan. Back in Seoul we visited EomMaNe. Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, handicapped children center, where Fransisco leads a dedicated team. On Monday the Inaugural Provincial Chapter began. The Province was officially erected April 28, 2018. On Wednesday 27 June,

Fr. Benedict Ko MSC was elected Provincial Superior. We congratulate him and the Korean community and pray for him. We thank Fr Matthew Park MSC for his exceptional leadership over the last six years. We also congratulate the new Provincial Council; Fr Paul Kim, Br Gaspar, Fr Balthasar, and Fr Mikaele MSC (who is also now the Province Secretary). The Chapter concluded with a liturgy of commissioning.

After the Chapter we met with the Seoul LayMSC group who under the guidance of Balthasar, number about fifty. Next day was with Juanito who has a ministry in a Seoul hospital. Ignazio has been a patient in this hospital for two years with Parkinson's disease. May God continue to bless the ministry and community life of our confreres in South Korea.



VISIT TO UAF

On July 4th André Claessens left the general house for a Summer break of three weeks in Belgium. On August 2nd he set off for Congo-Kinshasa where he would remain the whole month for a visit to the confreres of this extended district of UAF. At first he crossed the river Congo and went to Congo Brazzaville, together with the district bursar Grevisse Bokuma, to visit the confreres living in the parish of St Ambroise in Nkozo, an expanding quarter at the outskirt of the capital. This area became recently an independant parish and was entrusted to the MSC. Till 2017 we were not present in this country, but we got some vocations there.

When he returned to Kinshasa a small aircraft brought him on August 9th to Boende in the Equator region of the country, near the river Tshuapa, for a weeks visit to the sector of Upper-Tshuapa where 2 remaining Belgian MSC are still working in the mission (200 hectares) of St. Martin and its hinterland (2x surface of Belgium) together with a few African members of the UAF. Some of the MSC working in the missions of Bolukutu and Yalusaka in the neigbour diocese of Bokungu-Ikela came with their impressive Yamaha motos till Boende to meet André because of the short time available and the impossible roads in the bush. Also the district superior Fr. Dieudonné Kenda who visited this remote area came with them so that a meeting with most of the confreres of the sector could take place at the mission of St. Martin where all could share their joys and projects while rejoicing in the brotherly hospitality.

On Thursday 16th another aircraft brought André and Dieudonné to Mbandaka for a still



shorter visit because on the 18th they had to return to the capital Kinshasa. Unfortunately, as soon as he arrived in Mbandaka, André had to go to hospital for a few days treatment. He was even the first patient in a new building of the hospital Jules Chevalier of the Daughters of O.L.S.H. The meeting with the African confreres and one Belgian confrere working and living in Mbandaka was thus very brief. On Saturday afternoon he was able to continue his journey and returned to the 3rd Street in Limete where the district superior has his residence and all confreres find every necessary help when they come to the capital for one reason or another.



VISIT TO PARAGUAY

Sunday 19th was an important feast day for the district because nine young men were finishing their noviciate in Kimwenza and celebrating their first profession! A lot of confreres and people (family members, friends) from all over the city came to that joyful assembly and were witnesses of this commitment that Fr. André accepted in the name of Fr. General, who had sent his congratulations and best wishes. Four other young men started their noviciate that day, guided by Fr. Jonas Mouchi (Cameroon) who took over from the previous novice master Fr. Bruno Kuen (Austria, °1936) and by Br. Paul Tenda (DRCongo) who worked for 16 years in the district of Senegal.

This cheerful event was also an opportunity to express deep gratitude to Fr. Bruno for the many times since 1985 that he had been involved in the noviciate as novice master or socius. In our UAF, Fr. Bruno is really a "monument". He started pedagogical studies in 1964 at the Lovanium University in Kinshasa and after his holidays now he'll return to the noviciate as socius.

On Saturday 25th Fr. Andre assisted at the recollection of the teachers working in our secondary school OLSH in Matete and shared with them important insights of the last MSC general chapter. On Sunday morning he presided over the eucharist in our big parish S. Marie Madeleine of Matete. His last days were filled with a visit of the pre-noviciate in Righini, the MSC assembly of the Kinshasa area and the meeting of the district council. He left the country on the 30th for Belgium, where he took the train to Münster in order to be present at the chapter of the N. German province starting on September 2nd. The last time André visited the district was in 2006 as provincial of the Belgian MSC who started working in Congo in 1924. Our UAF confreres have started already the preparations for the celebration of this centenary MSC presence but are also very worried and focussed on the outcome of the promised presidential elections of next December. Thanks to all for your kindest hospitality, your missionary life in tough circumstances and your brotherly sharings.

In January of next year (2019) the mission in Paraguay will complete 20 years. It began with the desire of the MSCs of the Spanish Province to have one more place of mission in America and with the appointment of Cardinal Bergoglio, Archbishop of Buenos Aires - today Pope Francis - for the region of Paraguay.

Currently the mission has 03 MSCs from the Spanish Province (Toni, Rafael and Sérgio) and two MSC's from the Union of India (Kumar and Anthony). They are present in 03 parishes: São Pio X (in Asunción); Santa Teresa D'Ávila (in the city of Bertoni) and São Sinfrônio (in the city of Yeros). In addition to the 5 MSCs living in Paraguay, this year the group has 1 formandi (Cristiam) in the Novitiate in Brazil.

In the month of June, when I was with them on this first visit, we had days of sharing with these MSC's. I had the opportunity to attend their Community Monthly Meeting where we were able to share various issues. I also had the opportunity to visit the 3 parishes where we are there and to know their work. I thank the confreres of Paraguay for their warm welcome.

"Something new is being born" or better said: "we are called to give birth to something new". Every life process involves dying to something wich gives way to something new. Those are the sensations that I share with all of you, after



visiting the MSC that live in Canada. After so many decades of pastoral and educational presence; of sending missionaries to the Dominican Republic and Mexico, now is the time to restart a future here that we still do not understand clearly but being instruments of the Kingdom of God, we can discover the way forward.

After living wonderful missionary а commitment, today there is a group of MSC living in the city of Quebec in two communities. Most of them live their well-deserved retirement but still alive with missionary spirit. There is an MSC community in the interior of Quebec where two MSCs from the Dominican Republic and one from Haiti make a prophetic presence in a large rural parish. One MSC alternates his Missionary work between Nicaragua and the city of Quebec. And in Montreal, there are four MSCs from Canada and two from the UAF, all of them living

VISIT TO ECUADOR

The current mission in Ecuador began in 1996 as an Interprovincial Mission of the three provinces of Brazil (São Paulo, Rio de Janeiro and Curitiba). The first 3 MSCs that went to Ecuador, from these 3 Provinces were: Antônio Carlos (Province of São Paulo); Aílton Izaías (Province of Rio de Janeiro); and Moacir Figueiredo (Province of Curitiba).

Currently the mission counts on 8 MSC's, namely: From the Curutiba's Province, the Ecuadorians Marcelo and Gabriel and the Brazilians Moacir, Cicero and Zequinha; from the Rio de Janeiro's Province, Aílton Izaías; from the Indonesia's Province, Manu, Paco and Ricardo. Apart from these, there is still José Luiz Ruiz, an Ecuadorian, professed of temporary votes, who is doing a process of discernment in Curitiba.

SPIRITUALITY COURSE OF THE CHEVALIER FAMILY IN AMERICA



The aim of the course was: To deepen in the Spirituality of the Heart, as a source of LIFE, so that as a Chevalier Family, we be builders of Justice, Peace and Care for Creation. The methodology used was the method from Latin America: See, Judge and Act.

The number of participants ranged between 40 and 45. Intercultural richness was present with 11 countries, among them: India, Indonesia, Dominican Republic, Brazil, Paraguay, Argentina, Peru, Ecuador and El Salvador, among others.

On Sunday 15, our sharing as a Chevalier Family began with a lunch organized by the Laity and the MSC of Ecuador, in the Formation House.

The topics proposed for our reflection were during these 10 days were:

Day 16 (SEE) - For this part we were accompanied by Sr. Margarita, msc and Lic. Boris Tobar. Both presented the reality of Latin America, placing a particular emphasis on one or other country.

Day 17 (SEE) - We continued the reflexion with Carlos Man-Ging, SJ, who focused more on the aspect of justice, understood as Mercy. In that way, we saw the ecological crisis. poverty and Church, enlightened by Laudato Sí and with the hopeful song of the Magnificat, as a spiritual itinerary for all missionary disciples.

Day 18 (SEE) - We were accompanied by a team of young people from REPAM (Ecclesial Network Panamazonica), who made us aware of the entire situation in our Amazon, where we are all co-responsible for it's living or dying. They explained to us that there is little awareness of

beautiful Ecuador.

Days 22 and 23 - We had two days of silent retreat. We were accompanied by Father Valentim, msc. The theme of the retreat was from Christian martyrdom. They were very deep and questioning days, because in one of the talks he said: "The martyr sees as God sees, the mission is the mission of God and it is not my little mission ... Am I in the mission that is God's? Or in mine? "

Days 24 and 25 (ACT) - At first we had the presentation of the work experience of Sr. María, msc at ISDEN (MSC Cristoforis Deneke Health Institute). Later we continued with the

DAY 19 (JUDGE) -Fr. Mario, msc enlightened us with God's Word, inviting us to

conform our life to the Project of the Beatitudes, which will help us to live in the building of Peace.

Day 20 (JUDGE) - Fr. Marvin, msc led the day making a synthesis of how to Judge; and so, clarify and reinforce concepts that helped us for the work of action.

Day 21 - Saturday 21, we had a beautiful day of sightseeing. We were "literally" in the Middle of the World and Historical Center. We visited theNational Basilica, where the MSC arrived in 1874. The dream of Father Chevalier has now becomes a reality with the presence not only of the MSC, but also of the MSC Laity of Olquita Garcia.

Finally, we finished on the 25th with the closing Mass presided by Father Humberto, msc (General Council of the msc), who in a simple and profound way helped us to say goodbye to the experience we lived in these days of the course, inviting us to remember who we are as Family Chevalier, and thus be presence of the Heart of God in our world.

Thank you, Lord, for the experience of being brothers and sisters in this journey. Teach us to walk with confidence and with our eyes fixed on your Heart, to be brave and to risk for LIFE. Sr. Carolin, MSC

VISIT TO AUSTRALIA PROVINCE



It is difficult to summarize in few words all the а experience lived through the visit to the majority of Communities MSC in Australia and; above all, through the personal encounter with each MSC. I could see that, after a history of more than one hundred and twenty-five our MSC years, Congregation continues to be an ecclesial, social,

educational and moral force and presence in this country / continent, even in the midst of a difficult and challenging ecclesiastical situation at the present time. There are many challenges to face and, as a province, they are doing it with courage and effectiveness.

Upon visiting the different missions I can share with all of you that there is a lot of MSC history. Places like the Diocese of Darwin (Wadeye, Bathurst Island, Daily Rivers), I could notice and feel the MSC roots in such a large territory. More or less since 1905, the MSCs have given their lives for the sake of our aboriginal brothers. But they are also in Sydney, Canberra, Adelaide,

Toowoomba, Douglas Park and Melburne, to mention the communities that I could visit. I found MSC that strive to make present the Spirituality of the Heart of Jesus in the Schools, through Laity and some msc. The young people of our schools and boarding schools are struggling to be the Heart of God in today's world. Likewise, I found msc struggling to make our Parishes spaces to promote: life, inclusiveness and multiculturalism. And Douglas Park is like a icon of: revitalization, contemplation, prayer, personal development, ecumenism and much more, aintegrated proposal of a new humanity committed to the reality of today's world. Also, MSC engaged in the office of missions and JPIC projects in different realities and peripheries of the Australian influence.

I conclude by sharing the hope of the provincial leadership team that might have a new vocational awakening in this historic MSC Province. In all the communities visited, especially in Kensington, through dialogue with our elders, I confirmed again that the MSC Charism is "someone" not something, and it is possible to live it throughout many years.

ARTICLE

FR. CHEVALIER AND THE MINISTRY OF FORMATION Fr. Hans KWACKMAN

The first MSC Constitutions of 1877 clearly express Chevalier's expectations concerning the MSCs. MSCs are called "to imitate the virtues of the divine Heart and to propagate more widely the knowledge and veneration of this Heart." They should commit themselves to live the Devotion to the Sacred Heart in such a way that it becomes an effective remedy for the ills of the time. The best way to carry out this mission is, according to Chevalier, by the ministry of formation. Hearts afflicted by indifference towards God's commandments and by egoism to the needs of the poor, should be transformed into obedient and caring hearts, while taking the Heart of Christ as a model.

To reach that purpose, Chevalier declares that first of all the MSCs themselves should enter into an ongoing process of self-formation, while committing themselves, "to acquiring knowledge of devotion to the Sacred Heart," in the broad sense as understood by Chevalier himself. "We should certainly know what we are required to teach" he says.

Furthermore, the ministry of formation of the youth, Chevalier specifies as one of "the principal aims" of the congregation. He highlights "the sublimity of so great a mission," even if "human nature often may find (this ministry) unpleasant and unattractive." After all, he says, "the well -being of society, both civil and ecclesiastical, hinges especially on the Christian education of youth."

In the same Constitutions Chevalier declares that the formation of associated diocesan priests and lay people, might be done by founding aggregations as well as by giving retreats and offer Spiritual Exercises. To make this happen, he built a large compound in Issoudun. After all, there the many rooms would not only serve as residence for the MSC community, but also provide facilities for a formation and retreat center, as still is its purpose today.


Also the first draft of the Constitutions of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, written in 1874, stipulates that education and formation should be the chief ministry of their apostolate of the Sacred Heart. Consequently, their first Constitutions, published in 1874, specifies that the Daughters would make "a thorough study of the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart. For it is essential that they themselves know what they are to practice all their life and to impart to others." The Christian education of girls, Chevalier considered to be the basis of the Christian family and the very foundation of the regeneration of society.

However, since 1876 the French Republican Government started taking measures against teaching Congregations in France. Its regulations made the implementation of the ministry of formation as a special aim of Chevalier's congregations, at least in France, impossible.

In the MSC Constitutions of 1907, the ministry of formation is still mentioned among the special apostolic activities of the Congregation. However, in the missionary tradition of the MSC Congregation, another element of Chevalier's spirit, also included in the MSC Constitutions of 1877, began to predominate, namely that the members "must be ever ready to undertake any kind of apostolic ministry."

The renewed MSC Constitutions of 1985 only outline the internal formation of the members of the Congregation itself. Nothing is said on formation of our spirituality, today called a Spirituality of the Heart, as a specific ministry and missionary activity. Yet, in their latest editions of the Constitutions, the MSC Sisters and the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, still explicitly refer to education and faith-formation as one of the forms of their apostolic ministries.





Death of Father Chevalier (by Pe. Piperon)

Father Chevalier's sickness was rapidly bringing his life to an End. Monday, October 21 was the day on which God, in the plans of his infinite mercy, chose to call to himself his faithful servant.

Our Superior General, Father Meyer, had set out in haste from Rome and arrived at Issoudun during the night. Immediately on his arrival, he hurried to Father Chevalier who recognised him and still had the strength to bless him. Father Meyer did not leave him again.

Towards midday a crisis seemed to indicate the end. Father Meyer then had the community assembled and with them recited the prayers for the dying. From this moment on prayers were said continually at the death bed of our Father. At three o'clock, there was a fresh crisis, no less painful than what had preceded; but the infirmarian's intervention helped him surmount it. This was the last of his sufferings. After that he remained for more than two hours in great calm, almost motionless, as if in a peaceful sleep.

Then, like the flickering out of a flame, he fell peacefully asleep in the Lord. The clock struck half past five and the evening Angelus was ringing in the parish.

Thus died our venerated and beloved Father, surrounded by his intimates and by some of his religious who had come from various parts to assist at his last hour and to render him their final respects.

He had lived eighty-three years, six months and six days, the greater part of which. - fifty-three years - had, by a special design of divine Providence, been spent in the town of Issoudun.
